Letter From Our Executive Director

Hey y'all,

This year has been one for the record books, and that seems only fitting as the SCC celebrated 30 years of climbing conservation and advocacy in 2023. What began in a shoe box in 1993 has grown into a tri-state organization that serves thousands of climbers and now more than 50 climbing areas.

At Sunset Rock, 30 years ago, closures were rampant across the southeast and climbers were being shut out of countless areas. That's when a small group of climbers banded together to sweat it out in long labor intensive work days to show the park service that we deserve to be here, just to climb. That hard work paid off and sparked a chain of events that has led to truly remarkable accomplishments.

This year alone - we closed on the purchase of the Citadel Boulders, opened up access to several climbing areas including Walden's Ridge Park, made incredible progress at Woodcock, held the most attended Trail Daze of Summer, and raised the bar on our membership base.

I can't help but think about each of you that have helped us in the past 30 years. What started as an all volunteer organization has remained largely that. We remain a coalition of dedicated climbers who continue to rise to the challenge and rally together to protect even more access to climbing. From the very trail we are walking on, to the access and ability to climb at these crags we hold so dearly, individual climbers working together to protect access for future generations remains the heartbeat of the SCC. I have such an appreciation for all of the folks who have given so much of their blood sweat and tears to preserving access to climbing for future generations.

At our 30th celebration, we spoke about legacy and what it means to leave your mark on the climbing community. Every time a climber decides to make a positive action or a positive change, that is the coalition at work. It's the southern grit and determination from each of you that makes up the strength of this organization.

Every time climbers take even the smallest of actions, it has such a large impact and influence. And I've got news for that group of climbers that started in a shoe box 30 years ago, we have no plans of slowing down any time soon.

So I encourage all of you as we mark this time in history and celebrate the 30th anniversary together, take it in, start up a conversation with a person you don't know and hear about their stories, and dream about what this coalition can do, stronger than ever, over the next 30 years.

SCC's Latest Acquisition - Citadel Boulders - Fort Payne, AL

SCC and Access Fund announced the purchase of the Citadel Boulders on December 1, 2023. The acquisition includes 58 acres of undeveloped land surrounding an incredible boulder field. It is more than two decades in the making and another landmark victory for climbing and conservation in the Southeast. The Citadel Boulders contain more than 150 unique problems over dozens of distinct sandstone boulders.

There has been incredibly positive community support both locally and nationally. We have hosted our first of many trail days that will work to remove graffiti, trash, and install infrastructure to ready the preserve for visitors in early 2024. Community members across generations are elated to finally see the project come together.

Citadel Project Underway

While initial funding has secured the Citadel Boulders, SCC needs the help of local climbers, brands, and conservationists to raise nearly \$140,000 over the next three years to pay off the conservation loans to complete the purchase.






Community Support

Progress at Woodcock Continues

The total cost of opening a new climbing area goes beyond the cost of the land itself. Sustainable crags need parking, trails, signage to know where to go, as well as long term care and maintenance – just to name a few things. The overall project cost for opening Woodcock Cove was nearly \$245,000. We have raised \$217,798 for the project and loan repayment. We have made great progress and are looking ahead at the work that remains.

Lyndhurst Foundation awarded SCC with a grant of \$25,000 to help us make a massive leap towards the finish line of paying off Woodcock Cove. With the contributions raised through our Conservation Legacy Program, our matching donors, crowdsource donations, as well as BYOB, we've made great progress!

Access Wins in the Region

Buck's Pocket

SCC and the Alabama State Parks Department announced a new partnership to recognize and support rock climbing at Buck's Pocket State Park in 2023.

This partnership will support the Alabama State Parks Trail Crew in establishing new trails leading to the cliffline that will aid climbers in reaching the base of the cliff and will provide new points of interest for hikers and other park users alike. As part of the SCC's North Alabama Climbing Initiative, this project has also been supported by the Access Fund's Climbing Conservation Grant Program.







Jake's Woods

The Conservation Fund and Jones County announced the protection of the historic, 28-acre Jake's Woods property in Clinton, Georgia, which will become a new county park open to the public starting in 2024. SCC is proud to work alongside The Conservation Fund, Jones County, Access Fund and our other partners to honor the history and natural beauty of Jake's Woods. Future generations can enjoy exploring the incredible granite boulders and the climbing opportunities that exist there.

This bouldering area and public park is a huge win for the small but mighty climbing community growing in Macon, Georgia. SCC looks forward to calling volunteers to action to help beautify the boulder field.

Access Wins in the Region

Walden's Ridge Park

After 7 years of hard work alongside the park partners, Walden's Ridge Park finally opened to the public on September 30, 2023. Thank you to Hamilton County Tennessee Parks & Recreation Department, Hamilton County Mayor's Office, The Land Trust for Tennessee, SORBA, IMBA Trail Solutions, North Chickamauga Creek Conservancy, and all the SCC volunteers who came out to trail days!

The new 200-acre park, located in Chattanooga, TN, features over 10 miles of trails, including mountain biking, hiking, trail running, and bouldering. Climbers can look forward to exploring the park and it's 24+ unique boulders ranging in difficulty level.











Rainbow Mountain Preserve

After local volunteer, Logan Kennedy brought Rainbow Mountain to the SCC - we worked quickly with the City of Madison and the Land Trust of North Alabama to embark on a new partnership to allow for climbing at the preserve as well as offer stewardship support to help clean up the graffiti there. Huntsville climbers have enjoyed after-work sessions and exploring the climbing opportunities that exist within the preserve.

Voice for Climbers in the TAG region

This year, SCC made sure climbers had a voice on several comment periods for varying land managers ranging from the municipal to federal levels. SCC engaged in public comment periods writing several letters, attended tri-state coalition meetings, and attended outdoor recreation and state-to-state coalition meetings to ensure that climbers have a seat at the table and are considered as these groups identify recreational opportunities within the region.



Tallulah Gorge


SCC, Access Fund, and American Alpine Club – ATL are working collaboratively to improve the climbing experience at Tallulah Gorge State Park and create a policy, through partnership, that is in line with modern climbing management and easier for park staff to implement, as well as more positive to climbers. This year, we initiated a task force and continued capturing data on climbing access at Tallulah Gorge. We want to give a huge thank you to Tallulah Adventures for hosting SCC for a free community showing of Reel Rock 17 and for partnering with us throughout the year.





SCC saw huge success in 2023 getting folks psyched about stewardship. We hosted our inaugural Trail Skills Workshop and the largest Trail Daze of Summer to date. That momentum carried throughout the fall and winter seasons as we tackled our first Citadel Trail Days and continued to focus on improving SCC-owned properties. In addition to our many boots-on-the-ground projects, SCC has become laser-focused on educational initiatives that motivate the collective community to think about stewardship going beyond trail days. Stewardship plays a role every time a climber visits the crag. The small actions that climbers take that lead to big influence and positive impact, are a big stewardship focus for the SCC in 2023 and 2024.

679 stewards attended 66 work events and worked 2,773 hours across 24 locations



Trail Daze of Summer - Inspiring Stewardship

For our 5th anniversary of Trail Daze of Summer, we hosted **11 Trail Days**, with **238 volunteers**. Volunteers put in a total of **814 stewardship hours** between June and August. We owe so much of that engagement and growth to On the Road and Off for seeing the need and coming up with a targeted program to fill that need.

To harness our amazing volunteer power, we need more skilled volunteer leaders to make our projects effective and high quality. On the Road and Off rose to the challenge again and helped us host our very first Trail Skills Workshop.

For the pilot version of this concept, we reached out to our key volunteers, Area Reps, and former Trail Daze rockstars to offer some trail skills training. We hosted two workshop days – one at Woodcock Cove and the other at Hospital Boulders. The program focused on developing critical skills to help build more trail leaders in our region.




Prioritizing our Properties

While purchasing threatened climbing areas will always be a critical part of our mission, what's equally important is the preservation of our current climbing resources. In 2023, we focused on improving SCC-owned property, as we continued to see high visitation at many of our crags.

We chipped away at maintenance work on our properties including building a retaining wall at Hospital Boulders, tackling erosion control work on the Yellow Bluff approach trail, and improving property maps, signage, and parking.

Prioritizing our Properties

King's Bluff

Over a six-month period of time, SCC has been working on a revitalization effort at our Kings Bluff property in Clarksville, TN. What began as graffiti removal and trash clean-up, led to major infrastructure improvements, erosion control work, new signage, and more. We'd like to thank the 57 volunteers who put in a combined total of 276 hours on this project. We'd also like to thank our partners at Athletic Brewing Company for funding a majority of this effort and to the new Friends of King's Bluff group for their continued efforts.



While the work is never done, and we have many more projects to tackle at King Bluff, we were able to celebrate the recent efforts with a special event on June 17th, 2023. Kings Bluff was donated to SCC by Drane Lyttle and family in 2002 and one of her wishes was to have a bench installed on the bluff to honor her father and grandfather who gave them the property and would be so pleased with the donation. We welcomed the family to the bluff to enjoy their new bench and celebrate this new era of Kings Bluff. The preservation of Kings Bluff is thanks to the hard work of many volunteers and community members.

Regional Work

Campbellton Creek Nature Preserve

Our progress in opening a second climbing area in South Fulton, GA is well underway. We partnered with Southeastern Trust for Parks and Land (STPL) as part of our Rising Climbing Stewards Program (RCS). Our RCS Program engages groups in a presentation and hands-on activity that teaches elements of the Climber's Pact and climbing area etiquette, followed by a trail day at a local climbing area.

This park provided a natural outdoor experience for residents of South Fulton. The boulders that are protected here provide a unique opportunity to preserve an often exclusive experience. There are fresh, never-before-climbed boulders, ripe for the picking. The SCC and STPL agreed to preserve this opportunity and introduce young Atlanta youth into the climbing community and to provide the opportunity for them to etch their names in history with their own first-ascents (FAs).









Alabama Climbing Initiative Continues

The Northern Alabama Climbing Initiative is a regional climbing stewardship project that addresses the growth of climbing in the greater Huntsville and Gadsden areas. The goal of the project is to create more sustainable and resilient climbing resources through site improvement work, increased access, and local community partnerships. In 2023, we were thrilled to check off several maintenance projects as well as officially open climbing access at Buck's Pocket State Park, Rainbow Mountain, and Noccalula Falls! This initiative was supported by the Access Fund Climbing Conservation Grant Program.

Anchor Maintenance

The SCC supplies bolts and anchors to be distributed at no cost to SCC members to maintain *established* climbing routes in Tennessee, Alabama & Georgia. Guiding policies to implement the distribution of bolts and anchors are in place.

Fixed Hardware Committee


The committee monitors Bad Bolt Reports, responds to inquiries sent to SCC for aging fixed hardware needs, and puts on clinics for community members interested in learning how to replace aging hardware. This year, the group worked to put together an online resource so our community can get connected and involved. They also made a group on social media to better get connected with individuals who are interested in hardware replacement. The total number of replacements listed includes everything that goes into replacing aging hardware - from the lead bolt to the quick links, the rings, or the mussy hooks that go on the anchor.



Black Diamond Golden Carabiner Event

Black Diamond hosted the Golden Carabiner event here in Chattanooga TN to raise money for fixed hardware replacement. They gave away a mountain of swag for those lucky competitors who found a golden carabiner and raised \$1,600 with ticket sales to the event. Huge thank you to Black Diamond for their continued support and for helping us tackle the aging hardware replacement needs of the southeast.





This year the SCC celebrated 30 years of climbing conservation together, hosted member-only events, found community throughout the summer months, and hosted our biggest competitions to date. We have a lot to be grateful for and are so incredibly proud as we reflect back on what our community accomplished together this year. Collectively all of our actions make up a larger positive impact that will benefit future generations of southeastern climbers.

Education Through Empowerment

At the beginning of every climbing season, the SCC works to educate the community about critical ethics, etiquette, and best practices when climbing at our outdoor crags. This year, the SCC Education Committee has launched a new communications campaign called the "Empowerment" campaign that seeks to bridge a current mentorship gap in climbing, educate on outdoor best practices to new climbers, and foster a sense of belonging through mindful actions and meaningful behaviors that promote sustainable use of climbing areas.

To that end, several digital and print assets help support the campaign, generously provided by an anonymous donor, utilizing an array of marketing and communications channels. Print materials include a collection of items to hand out at tabling and community events such as a bookmark for guidebooks and a brochure that will engage climbers with a climbing pact of ethics and best practices. We have also written talking points for our Community Ambassadors related to the key messages of the campaign.





Note from our Treasurer


The SCC had a record-breaking year in fundraising and is in a strong position financially. We have raised more than half the cost of the Citadel Boulders project, and are just under \$10,000 from paying down our Woodcock Loan.

In my time as treasurer, I set a goal to have up-to-date and clear financials and we have accomplished just that. As my term as treasurer comes to an end, I look forward to continuing to help the SCC prosper both as a strong supporter and board member of the SCC. 

Note from our Treasurer


The income statement once again does not reflect the payments made to the Woodcock Loan because those are reflected on our balance sheet. This year we made \$65,000 towards paying the loan off and will make another \$33,500 payment in January 2024. Those funds are restricted for that purpose as well as trail work in 2024.

This also does not reflect some of the expenses thus far to the Citadel as those are reflected on the balance sheet as well, and total nearly \$170,000.




How long have you been climbing?




Our member's survey results have shown that we have a variety of climbing experience, but room to grow with reaching new climbers.

The survey results indicated that we have a diverse group of climbing disciplines and that our members are interested in attending a variety of events.




In the last year did you attend any of the following? 126 responses


